We struggle towards a world in which all people live in freedom from oppression, in which people are valued as whole human beings rather than exploited in a quest for productivity and profits.

February 2011 marked the month where Governor Scott Walker attempted to strip public sectors of their right to collectively bargain with their employers, disabling the workers from their freedom to association; denying them of basic rights that all humans should have!

This government abuse led to the students of SLAC to organize rallies day and night with TAA, AFSCME, and other community members, sleep in the capitol countless times, plan sit ins, banner dropped, etc.

What is SLAC?

The Student Labor Action Coalition is a coalition of students, workers, and labor activists dedicated to:

Recent Campaigns

Nike

In 2009, Nike cut all orders from factories in Honduras because workers began to organize against the sweatshop conditions and ran off to another third world country where organizing wasn't a problem. Soon after, USAS launched a national campaign against the injustice from Nike on their workers demanding that Nike pay back \$2.5 million in severance pay to the 1,800 workers who were out of a job overnight. During this fight, SLACers had successfully pressured the late Chancellor Martin into cutting Nike's contract if Nike doesn't agree meet the demands of students and workers. Not long after the contract cut, in 2010, Nike agreed to the demands of workers and USAS alike.

Workers' Rights' Consortium (WRC)

The WRC board was a plan implemented by USAS to monitor factory conditions all over the world and has been nationally recognized by universities, corporations, and labor experts. USAS chapters are continuously educating their administers about the working conditions of factories that they contract with and pressuring them to sign onto the WRC so that our universities are moving towards a ethical purchases in the apparel industry. UW-Madison has long been signed and seats the WRC board as we have been historically, and still are on the front line of this labor movement.

With collective bargaining stripped from all of our public sector workers by Governor Scott Walker, SLAC has been on their toes organizing throughout the massive protests and all summer long. At the fore front in organizing students and working hand in hand with the American Federation of County and Municipal Employees (AFSCME) and the Teachers' Assistants' Association (TAA), SLAC sees a positive end in sight for students and workers.
